

# This we can only do if we have people to teach.

f someone were to ask me, 'What's the number one thing, in essence, that you left behind?'... it was the teaching of others, so that they could take my work and take it further" is a quote credited to Vidal Sassoon (noted Hair Stylist, entrepreneur and philanthropist). True biblical discipleship is taking what we have learned and put into practice and sharing it with others who will faithfully receive it and do likewise (2 Tim. 2:2; Matt. 28:19-20).

This we do with all our faith and with all our might. This we can only do if we have people to teach. I want to implore you to seek out from among you certain men who are full of the Spirit and wisdom (Acts 6:3) who can be set apart to train for a couple of years so as to make an eternal difference. That seems like a good exchange, doesn't it? A couple of years of spiritual discipline for the eternal sake of the countless many? If you need them, we'll send them back to you when they are finished here so that you can send someone else.

Imagine how much farther the work of Christ could go if all the congregations of the Lord's church participated in this cycle? Imagine the difference it might make in heaven!

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# Prison Bars Can't Stop The Gospel

#### I MET LARRY ROBERTS IN PRISON.

r. Henry Petree invited me to meet Larry at Jess Dunn Correctional Center in Taft, Oklahoma. Dr. Petree is the administrator of the Sunset Satellite School in Jess Dunn Correctional Center and has been involved in prison ministry since about 1999. I traveled to Fort Gibson, Oklahoma, and met Dr. Petree and his wife, Cheryl. Cheryl Petree administers a prison ministry for women at Eddie Warrior Correctional Center in Taft, Oklahoma. Dr. Petree has been involved with the prison ministry at Jess Dunn Correctional Center for about 16 years. He wanted me to experience firsthand the effectiveness of God's Word communicated through Sunset Satellite School and the harvest it brought, which is Larry's new life in Christ.

Larry, who has since been released, shared how God's Word is alive and well in the prison. I sat down with Larry for a phone interview in February of this year, participating in a raw conversation about how God moved him to study His Word and be rebaptized. Now he is a free man—both physically and spiritually—and he couldn't be more joyful!

SIBI's purpose and mission has always been "to train whole *persons* to take the whole *Gospel* to the whole *world*, wholly to please *God*."

When I started working with SIBI on January 1, 2022, I never envisioned that I would be helping a congregation with its prison ministry using SIBI materials, let alone a possible three or four prison ministries. God has truly blessed the men and women who work in prison ministry and has allowed me to catch a glimpse of what the work is all about.

Larry impressed me from the moment I met him. I was a little shocked at how happy and joy-filled he was even though he was a prisoner. He was very involved with the SIBI classes that Dr. Henry Petree was facilitating; he was even doing very well on the tests. On one test in particular he scored a 98. I don't recall anyone in our residential class at SIBI making a 98 on Richard Rogers' tests...especially in Old Testament History 1! SIBI's curriculum has been adapted and proven effective all over the world and now brings God's light into the darkest and scariest place that I can think of—prison!

The apostle Paul knew what it was like to be a prisoner (Acts 16:25; 2 Tim. 2:9). He also knew what it was like to be content in any circumstances (Phil. 4:11-13; 1 Cor. 9:22-23).

The following is from the phone interview I had with Larry. I asked him to tell me "his story" from childhood up to the present after his release from prison.

Larry said, "My mother was a dedicated member of the Lord's church. My mother has passed on, but she was a faithful member until her passing in 2007, and she was a big part in bringing me to the Lord. She would 'stay on me,' trying to get me to walk a straight path. She would tell me, 'You need to wake up; you know better!' I was able to reflect on things a lot in prison, especially hearing my mother's words telling me that I needed to get right with God."

Though Larry was raised in the church, he confesses he was the leader of the wrong crowd. Larry admits, "I thought the world had the answers....I went on to college and graduated with a degree in Safety, had a child, and was married for three years. The marriage ended in divorce. I then married again and had two more children. By age 29 I had been married and divorced twice and had a total of three children. I had many back surgeries and became addicted to pain pills and alcohol....These decisions eventually led me to prison. I didn't want to be there, but it was an eye-opening experience. I was able to connect with the Lord again in the darkest place I have ever been."

#### Tell me what it is like in prison.

I had never been in major trouble, but prison is like walking into the devil's living room. You can feel the evil as soon as you walk in. Even though it is full of people, you feel alone. It is a frightening and scary place. The inside is ten times worse than the outside. You feel helpless and hopeless in prison. It is a world inside a world. It has its own life—a life that you don't want to be a part of. It is the closest thing on this earth to being in hell.

## Tell me about your conversion in prison. How did that come about?

Ron Hass, who was with the Owasso Church of Christ prison ministry, would come in and hold the Church of Christ services at Jess Dunn prison. He also rebaptized me. Later, Ron Hass retired and Bill Dilks took over. Bill was more hands-on and had more of a classroom setting. He asked us what we would like to study, and then he would do an in-depth study on that topic. He gave me a deeper understanding of the Bible. I remember a time when we were locked down and no one could come in. I was doing short lessons and handing them out to people in my unit. In 2020, I asked Henry [Petree] for some material, and he brought me lessons on Philippians and Ephesians. I started studying on my own, and when I finished, I went back to him and asked him for more material. He gave me Bible History 1 and 2, which are also Sunset material. Every day I would work on a lesson until I finally finished Bible History 1 and 2, and that is when the Sunset classes were introduced to me through Henry Petree. ... Sunset still influences me today.

#### Who was the most influential person?

Jesus Christ. He has always been there waiting on me. He was patient....I wouldn't have known about Jesus if it wasn't for my mother. She gave me an example, day in and day out, of what it means to be a Christian.

## What are your plans now?

I just want to be faithful because he has given me a full life. If you don't have God, you do not have a full life. I want others to experience what I have experienced—of course, without a prison sentence. I am not sure what my future holds, but whatever He has me doing I will be doing it with the Lord in the lead.

## What would you like to say to someone who is in prison now?

Remember that God loves you. Galatians 2:20; John 3:16 — God gave his son for us. Search the scriptures for the truth. It is only God's Word that will set you free — John 8:32. There is no one out there that cares for you more than Jesus. You don't have to be without hope — 1 Peter 1:3-6. I would also like to say to anyone reading this, especially prisoners, that there is life after prison—because I am living it today.

Larry currently preaches for the Lone Grove Church of Christ in Lone Grove, Oklahoma, a small congregation of 25–30 members. During his eight-and-a-half-year stay in the Jess Dunn Correctional Center, Larry was moved to be rebaptized through effective Bible studies using Sunset Satellite School materials. The elders at Fort Gibson Church of Christ were "the hands and feet of Jesus" as they evangelized using the SIBI material as their teaching tool.

Larry doesn't want any glory because of anything that he has said or done; his only purpose is to glorify Jesus and spread the good news of the Kingdom to those who are willing to listen. Larry has a heart for God and wants all people to come to a knowledge of the truth! He is a true servant in God's kingdom. God not only redeemed Larry from sin, He also redeemed him from a terrible life behind bars. Larry's mission is to release all the "spiritual prisoners" from their "chains."

Larry, Dr. Petree, and I will be attending the National Prison Ministry Workshop in Corpus Christi, Texas, June 12–14, 2024. Dr. Petree will be one of the speakers at the workshop.

SIBI remains committed to its original purpose of taking the Gospel to the lost by training preachers and sending them out into the world to stateside and foreign mission fields. I believe the prison system is a mission field of its own—one that is receptive to God's Word.

It is interesting how God puts people in the exact place and situation He wants them. These are often places we didn't expect to find ourselves, but God knows what He wants us to do. So when circumstances in life work out the way they do, we have to trust God that it is for our overall benefit but also for His glory!

## A Letter for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Church

#### A systematic study of the book of Colossians by Matt Glawe

he book of Colossians is one of the most profound writings in all of scripture. In this short epistle, Paul presents Christ's preeminence and sovereignty over all created things as superior to a mixture of philosophies and false religious practices that were finding their way into the Lycus Valley churches. This same overarching problem threatens the Lord's church today, which makes Colossians as relevant now as it was when it was penned and delivered. It contains some of the highest Christology in all of scripture. Christ is presented as the sovereign creator, the controller of all things, the redeemer from sin, and the protector from evil spirits and powers. These elements, among others, make Colossians one of the most profound studies for the serious Bible student and for the church today. In preparation for writing this introduction, I read the entire epistle several times and was amazed at how marvelous this short work really is. The purpose of this introduction is to provide a foundational background of Colossians with regard to the recipients, themes, and difficult passages so that the reader can make proper application for the church in the twenty-first century.

## Recipients of the Epistle to the Colossians

The establishment of the church at Colossae is somewhat of a mystery. Unlike churches in other cities, such as Ephesus and Corinth, the book of Acts does not specifically mention its beginning. There

is no biblical account of Paul's visiting this city or establishing this church. It has been suggested that Paul could have visited the Lycus Valley cities during his third mission journey on his way to Ephesus,1 although the text does not specifically state that such a visit took place. If Paul did actually make these stops, it is possible that he founded churches there. However, internal evidence strongly indicates otherwise. It seems to indicate that Paul had never been there (Col. 2:1). The beginning of the letter states that Epaphras taught the Colossians the Gospel, which strongly indicates that he founded this congregation (Col. 1:6-7). Epaphras was from Colossae and had become one of Paul's coworkers (Col. 4:12). At one point, he was with Paul in prison in Rome and could have been the source of Paul's information that led him to pen the letter.2

It is important to notice that this letter was not just for the church at Colossae, but also for its sister cities, Hierapolis and Laodicea—especially Laodicea (Col. 4:12–16). Given the wide array of false religions in this region, coupled with the fact that these three cities made up a metroplex and each had congregations of their own, this makes sense. These churches certainly would have faced


similar struggles and no doubt all needed this message.

#### Themes in Colossians

Several themes emerge from a study of Colossians. In order to accurately understand and apply them, we need to attempt to understand the heresy that caused Paul to write this epistle in the first place. The Lycus Valley was a hotbed for idolatry, cults, mysticism, and countless other pagan practices. Based on what Paul teaches in the epistle, it is apparent that a mixture of pagan religions was greatly influencing the churches. This is evident throughout the epistle as a whole. Because of the structure of the letter, two major thematic segments emerge—a theological section dealing with the preeminence of Christ and a practical section that deals with proper Christian living.

#### The Colossian Heresy

The heresy that led Paul to write this letter is the subject of much debate and speculation. James R. McConnell, in his well-researched article about the background and context of Colossians, wrote the following about the conflict at Colossae: "Scholars debate the identity of the 'opponents' in the letter to the Colossians. Although they are never explicitly named as such, the author in Col. 2:8–19 seems clearly to be warning the Colossians to avoid the behavior of a specific group of people. Who these people are has been the source of a great deal

of speculation." Notwithstanding this debate, careful study can provide some insight.

Although the specifics of the Colossian problem may be unknown, some characteristics of it can be identified from within the text. For example, consider Colossians 2:8: "See to it that no one takes you captive through philosophy and empty deception, according to the tradition of men, according to the elementary principles of the world, rather than according to Christ." Several things are listed that speak to the problem Paul is addressing. In two places, Paul speaks of "rulers and authorities," or "principalities and powers" (Col. 1:16; 2:15).4 Other things mentioned that speak of this problem are: circumcision and Jewish festivals (Col. 2:11-17); asceticism, the worship of angels, visions, and "the elementary principles of the world" (Col. 2:18-23). Because this list is so exhaustive, some scholars have even alleged that Paul was simply warning these churches about the society around them and wasn't speaking of a specific issue.5 However, it would seem that Paul was addressing a problem that had infiltrated the churches in the Lycus Valley. Wharton sums it up best by saying, "Paul does not detail the problem explicitly; it is inferred from his statements in opposition to the false teaching. The heresy was syncretistic in nature; there was a hybrid of religious and philosophical influences and teachings from Greek, Roman, and Jewish cultures that Paul exposes as heretical."6 From Paul's refutation of this hybrid of influences, some important themes emerge that are essential for the church today.

#### The Preeminence of Christ

Colossians 1:15–20 is the centerpiece of the doctrinal section of the letter and establishes the theme relating to the supremacy and preeminence of Christ. This text is widely believed to be an early Christian hymn, <sup>7</sup> which I will address later.

Gerald Paden notes that in this text "Christ is presented as having 'preeminence' in several distinct arenas, with each intrinsically related to the process of 'redemption.'"<sup>8</sup> Paden continues with this concise summary of the text in the verses that follow: "He is 'preeminent' in relation to God (vs. 15), to creation (vs. 15), to powers and authorities (vs. 16), to sustaining world order (vs. 17), to the church (vs. 18), to the resurrection (vs. 18), to the cosmic order of things (vs. 19–20), to the presentation of the church of God (vs. 22) and to the mystery (vs. 27).<sup>9</sup>

Paul applies the teaching of preeminence in two places in chapter two: "For in Him all the fullness of Deity dwells in bodily form, and in Him you have been made complete, and He is the head over all rule and authority" (Col. 2:9–10 NASB); "When He had disarmed the rulers and authorities, He made a public display of them, having triumphed over them through Him" (Col. 2:15 NASB). In these statements, Paul obliterates every form of heresy that may have infiltrated these churches by simply saying, "Christ is superior to all of it; He is all you need."

#### The Christian Life

Because of the syncretism that had crept into the lives of these Christians, Paul also needed to address some basic concepts of Christ-like living. This begins in the first two verses of chapter three: "Therefore if you have been raised up with Christ, keep seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on earth" (Col. 3:1–2 NASB). From this point forward, another major theme emerges from Colossians.

In this "ethical" section of the letter, nothing is specifically stated about the heresy being addressed in the letter; however, what Paul teaches is no doubt designed to strengthen them against it. 10 Patzia provides a concise summary of Colossians 3:1–4:6 by saying: "Paul discusses the believer's ethical life in a series of relationships that include Christ (3:1–8); the local church (3:9–17); the family (3:18–21); one's vocation (3:22–4:1); and society in

general (4:2–6)."<sup>11</sup> The overriding theme throughout this section is that for those who exalt Christ in their lives as Lord and Savior, deliverance from sin, death, despair, and corruption will be the result.<sup>12</sup> Christians can have confidence, courage, and purpose in this life knowing they serve the supreme ruler of the universe.

#### **Unique Literary Elements**

There are typically some unique literary components to each of Paul's epistles. Colossians is no exception. The two that will be addressed here come from Colossians 1:15–20 and 2:15. The first of these is widely believed to be an early Christian hymn; the second one uses the picture of a Roman triumphal procession.

#### The Hymn to Christ

While Colossians 1:15–20 is commonly thought to be a hymn, not much is known about its origin, meaning, structure, or purpose. <sup>13</sup> Origin and authorship are considered uncertain because the language and phraseology are different from any of Paul's other writings. <sup>14</sup> Furthermore, it wasn't out of the ordinary for Paul to utilize previously written material



very year SIBI hosts the Vision Workshop as part of our commitment to provide encouragement to the body of Christ. With the help of Levi Sisemore ('06), who specializes in hymnology, slides were prepared and the song was sung again during the SIBI Vision Workshop.



# Що я можу зробити?

y nightmare became frighteningly real. When Russia attacked Ukraine they occupied my village of Kalanchak. Russian soldiers were everywhere and even started taking children, sending them to Russia for "re-education." My husband was in the Ukrainian army fighting in another part of Ukraine, and I am the mother of five teenagers. *What should I do?* 

#### I decided we should leave—we should escape to Poland.

On the morning of February 24, 2022, my children and I were awakened by explosions. We were in a panic. I gathered my five children, not even all the necessary things and documents, and went to Kherson. On the way, we could already see the Russian military and then our soldiers farther away. As soon as we passed, fighting immediately began on the Antonovsky Bridge in Kherson. We realized that we couldn't go back and drove into the unknown. The road was incredibly hard. All the shops and gas stations were closed. We were lucky that we had a full tank of fuel. But there was no food at all. The children were hungry for two days. In Vinnytsia we managed to rent a hostel for a lot of money. Finally, we were able to feed the children and wash and rest only a little, because at 4:00 a.m. we left Vinnytsia, taking with us a woman with two children. Despite the fact that we left early, there were huge traffic jams on the road. It took us a long time to get to the Polish border, but it was very disappointing when we saw a 50-km (31-mile) line. It was very cold; we decided not to stand in the traffic but to go to Lviv. There we found out that there was a shelter for refugees. We stayed there for two days. Then I found a group online where a man agreed to help take us to the Polish border. That's how

we got to Poland. And in the refugee camp we were offered the chance to go to Elblag. That's how we ended up in this small town, where we live to this day. And sometimes when I am alone, I'm not. Then we were safe from the war and abduction of children but were in a foreign country where we didn't know the language or anyone else. My fears erupted. How will I support my children? Will they fall too far behind in school? Will we ever all be together again? Poland provided the basics of what we needed to live, but as the war went on the government began reducing the amount of help they would provide. What should I do?

It was then that I found the answer when I went to a church that offered a seminar on how to talk to my children about the trauma of war. There I found not only help but also a good place for me and my children and many other Ukrainians.

It was so simple yet so profound. Love was everywhere: in the way they respected us, provided food and other aid, cared for my children and provided not only necessities but hope as well. And they even took my children to a camp that was like the youth camps we were used to in Ukraine but held in Poland by American Christians who used to do this in Ukraine. My children loved it! God has been becoming real to me since we found this church. And my children and I try not to miss any of the church meetings, activities for the children, or any other events held by the church. It has become our home away from home.

And then, *the most amazing thing happened!* My husband was still in the military fighting in one of the most dangerous places. Every Sunday, for months, the whole church prayed for his safety and that we could be reunited. And our prayers were answered! He could come to us. We could all be together again. What joy we felt the day he arrived at the train station in Poland on our oldest daughter's 16th birthday!

We don't know yet what the future holds for us. All of us are wondering what we should do. But we know we have found something real at this church, something we don't ever want to be without. In fact, I am just one of the mothers here who told their husbands, "When your time in the army is over you are coming here because we are going to stay here with this church." This is what we think we should do.

The previous account is translated from an interview with Irena.

When the war broke out in 2022 more than 8,000,000 Ukrainians fled into other parts of Europe. More than 4,000,000 are still displaced. Most European countries welcomed Ukrainian refugees with open arms and support. Since the war has dragged on, these countries, even Poland, which took in the most refugees, have significantly reduced the amount and kind of aid they provide. Poland has even stopped providing food. This has provided a challenge but also a great opportunity to our humanitarian aid distribution and Kingdom expansion efforts among Ukrainian refugees in Europe.

One of the places where we have an outreach effort underway is in Elblag, Poland, which is a city of about 120,000 residents where there are over 7,000 Ukrainian refugees. Bogdan and Olga, who are alumni of Ukrainian Bible Institute (UBI), lead the aid distribution and outreach efforts there. And they planted a church there in 2023 whose attendance overflows its meeting place.

Irena, who has five teenagers, escaped Ukraine and went to Elblag. While there, she attended a seminar at the church and met Bogdan and Olga. Irena and her children are six of the hundreds of Ukrainian refugees that Sunset's Ukrainian relief effort is helping in Europe.

hese young men and women began AIM in August 2021, completed eight months of training in Lubbock, completed their field time, and graduated from AIM on March 9, 2024. The class elected Matt Glawe, one of their instructors, to give them a charge at their graduation ceremony. He reminded them that their worth comes from simply being a child of God and to use their experience in AIM to continually remind them of his presence.

At the end of the ceremony, Cory Burns, the AIM director, took a special moment to recognize Dace Whaite, who died from an ongoing medical condition while serving in Crosbyton, Texas. His field coordinator, Matt James (AIM '00), presented Dace's family with his AIM diploma.

The next AIM class already has 27 students who have applied or been accepted. They will be the first AIM class to utilize the new AIM housing that we are praying will be ready in time for classes to begin in August.

















After consulting with many different parties and after much prayer, SIBI decided to build permanent housing for the AlMers. God has been continually blessing AlM in this process with many amazing partners who have stepped in to make the idea of permanent housing a reality.





A location has been chosen one mile from the Sunset Church of Christ building, where the AlMers attend class. The initial funds were secured to purchase the land and begin the bidding process. The initial budget setup for the project was \$4.5 million. The existing housing situation put the administration in a place to step out in faith and appeal to the alumni and donors to help meet this immediate need. Some very generous donors helped begin the fundraising process by supplying a matching challenge of \$500,000 that was met within two months at the end of 2022. Since that time, other donors have stepped up to make significant gifts to the AIM housing project.











One of the most encouraging parts of the fundraising has been the overwhelming response from AIM Alumni and parents of present and past AIMers. Well over half of the donors for the AIM permanent housing have been individuals directly connected to AIM over the past 51 years.





Only God could have worked so mightily to move in the hearts of donors in such a way for us to completely fund the purchase of the property and the building costs. The remaining need to fully fund everything left for the project is now under \$350,000. God has blessed AIM to be able to make payments without incurring any debt. Praise God for his generosity and the generosity of so many who want to see more workers trained for the harvest. We look forward to seeing who God uses to help raise the remaining funds for this project.




Evangelism Forum and the SIBI Vision Workshop to represent WEI. They were also generously involved in the Solar Mission.



he SIBI nursery, which has been serving Sunset students and their children since 1972, stands as a testament to the vision of Bobbie Paden. Bobbie saw a need to provide child care so that husbands and wives could study God's Word and prepare for ministry together. Bobbie looked for the right person to

take on this ministry, and in 1977 when Doyle and Louise Gilliam returned to Lubbock


challenge to provide this vital service.

You will be responsible for washing and sterilizing toys and going to garage sales because that is where those toys can be bought cheap."

What Bobbie said and what Louise heard were two different things. Louise heard:

"How would you like to enable countless young women to study God's Word alongside their husbands? They will be effective co-workers and servants, but only if they are taught God's Word. They can study if they know that their little ones are in capable hands. How would you like to have in your care the hearts and minds of babies to love as God directs?"



"I pray you will have many useful years of service with SIBI's most precious treasures. Many of us have prayed for the right person, and now our prayers have been answered. Debbie, you have many outstanding qualities, too many to name. When I think of you, the words dependable, steadfast, and love come to mind. Your concern for the nursery is evident; your love of children and their families is exemplified by your work for the Lord. What a great example of true Christian living you are."



in his writings.15 Some have suggested that because numerous hymns were written to Zeus, whom some understood to be "the patron deity of Colossae,"16 the Colossians would have been familiar with these hymns and related well to the hymn to Christ.<sup>17</sup> As far as structure is concerned, Patzia notes that some Greek reconstructions of the text break it into three strophes. 18 From a simple reading of the text itself, the meaning of the hymn seems clear: Christ is superior and has preeminence over all things.

#### The Roman Triumphal Procession

Another unique literary feature found in Colossians is Paul's language in chapter two verse fifteen where he utilizes the concept of triumphal procession related to a Roman military victory. Clinton Arnold describes this victory parade by stating the following:

When a general defeated the opposing forces and won the battle, a "triumphal procession" would occur to celebrate the victory. The successful general would lead the procession, followed by his army singing hymns of victory and jubilantly reveling in their conquest. Also in the parade would be the defeated king along with all his surviving warriors. The disheartened and subdued enemies became a public spectacle for ridicule, with their subjugation paraded for all to see.19

The triumphal procession provides a powerful illustration of what Christ did at the cross. The cross was indeed the most decisive victory in history and a very public display of Christ's triumph. Not only was sin defeated at Calvary, but the "powers of darkness"20 were as well. Hebrews 2:14 says that Christ "render[ed] powerless him who had the power of death, that is, the devil." First John 3:8 states that Jesus' very purpose for appearing was "to destroy the works of the devil." Paul's use of this illustration would have painted a vivid picture of the victorious Christ to the Christians who read this letter.

#### Difficult Passages

#### Elemental Spirits of the World — 2:8, 20

One of the most challenging phrases to interpret from the Colossian epistle is found twice in Colossians chapter two—the phrase stoicheia tou kosmou.21 It appears only here and in Galatians four. The wide-ranging definition of stoicheia makes it difficult to discern exactly what Paul means in using it. Morton describes this term as "an element of language, an element of the physical world such as fire or water, a mathematical principle, a fundamental principle, a celestial body such as a star, or a spirit associated with a celestial body."22

Translators are not unified in their interpretation of this phrase. For example, the King James translators chose "rudiments of the world" in Colossians 2:8 and 20, as did the translators of the American Standard Version. The translators of the New American Standard Bible changed the word "rudiments" to "elementary principles." The English Standard Version, instead of "elementary principles" or "rudiments," has translated it "elemental spirits of the world." The Revised Standard Version and the New English Bible both use the phrase "elemental spirits of the universe" in their translations.23 This demonstrates clearly that translators are simply unsure of exactly what this phrase indicates. It is, however, evident that more recent translators interpret this, at least in part, as a reference to spirit beings of some sort.24 Whatever this phrase means, it is evident that it was taking these Christians captive and drawing them away from Christ; therefore. Paul had to address it.

#### Circumcision and Baptism — 2:11-12

Colossians 2:11-12 clearly identifies that Jewish syncretism was part of the Colossian heresy in that Paul discusses circumcision. Throughout the New Testament, this was a recurring theme among the churches.25 The difficult issue that arises from this passage is the comparison between circumcision and baptism. Some scholars allege that baptism is the "circumcision made without hands" spoken of in Colossians 2:11. For example, Patzia's view is clear in his commentary: "To experience the circumcision of Christ is nothing other than being buried and raised with him in baptism through faith."26 This

view, however, appears to be oversimplified and inaccurate.

Martin C. Salter has written a detailed article on this subject and believes that while "circumcision made without hands" takes place at baptism, it is not baptism itself.27 In a discussion of several possible interpretations of Colossians 2:11-12 he further explains his conclusion:

The first option [baptism=circumcision] seems difficult since the 'circumcision' is a stripping off whereas the baptism is a burial and resurrection.... Circumcision within the sphere of baptism is the most favourable option, particularly given the close link between Col. 2:11-12 and Rom. 6:3–6.... While there is a connection, therefore, between spiritual circumcision and baptism, they do not signify precisely the same realities.<sup>28</sup>

Wharton agrees with Salter and notes that "Christian circumcision is not baptism, it is putting off sin. However, it is God who does the work of cutting off sin when one by faith in Christ is baptized. Baptism is when God circumcises. It is in baptism that one expresses his faith in Christ to cut off sin."29 These observations fit best with the text of Colossians two. When someone is buried in baptism, he or she has expressed faith in God to go to work at cutting away his or her sin, which is exactly what God does at the moment of baptism.

#### The Message of Colossians for the Church in the 21st Century

Colossians is perhaps one of the most relevant epistles for the church today. With all of the confusion in the ever-increasing pagan influence on the world, the first half of Colossians should be the go-to book to teach the Christian how to navigate through it. As immorality runs rampant, Christians cannot help but be influenced. Colossians teaches believers how to behave and stay faithful in such an environment. Paul teaches us to remain in the truth, live sexually pure lives, live in peace with everyone around us, and put our trust in God—the one true and living God.30 The church as a whole can benefit greatly from this epistle when it

comes to some specific issues that t faces today, especially regarding faithfulness to the authority of Christ and His Word. For the sake of brevity, I will address just two.

#### Continue in the Faith

One of the key passages in Colossians that serves to apply much of its teaching is a phrase from Colossians 1:23: "if indeed you continue in the faith firmly established and steadfast, and not moved away from the hope of the gospel...." Prior to this statement, Paul has clearly established the supremacy of Christ over every created thing. After this statement, he urges the brethren to avoid being held captive by whoever or whatever was confusing the purity of their faith. "The faith" in this context is not the action of believing and trusting Christ and His Gospel; it is the object of the Colossians' belief in that Gospel message as taught by Epaphrasreferenced in Colossians 1:5-7.31

The lesson for the church of the twentyfirst century is to simply hold fast and remain faithful to the pure and simple teachings of the New Testament. The world is full of false religions that are in blatant contrast with Christianity, and these must be avoided. But more deceiving to the church are denominational teachings that are similar enough to the real thing to mislead the casual observer. This is where the teaching of Colossians is so applicable. For Christians to avoid being taken "captive through philosophy and empty deception, according to the tradition of men" (Col. 2:8, NASB), they must "continue in the faith, grounded and steadfast" (Col. 1:23, ASV). That is accomplished by living in the Word of God and "seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God" (Col. 3:1, NASB).

#### Teaching in Song

Colossians addresses singing in the New Testament church in a unique way compared to other passages that deal with it. In Colossians 3:16 Paul writes, "Let the word of Christ richly dwell within you, with all wisdom teaching and admonishing one another with psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with thankfulness in your hearts to God." This passage stands apart from other passages that mention singing because it speaks of teaching with song. Discussions of church music today typically revolve around emotions and mechanics

Through the divisive fog of church music discussions, Colossians serves to bring the importance of a song's message to the forefront and charges the entire congregation to preach it.33 Morton states that "The apostle is not allocating the task of teaching and preaching in song to a select group in the assembly-a choir or a praise team. Instead, he calls on the congregation as a whole to be involved in the work."34 Barry Joslin believes that this text has serious implications on the role of singing in Christian worship and that biblical worship should focus on content instead of style.35 He has thoroughly explored the implications of teaching as it relates to Colossians 3:16 and concludes that God intended musical worship as a vital means of teaching one another.36 I believe that he is correct in this observation.

Colossians 3:16 also speaks to the ageold problem of "worshiptainment,"37 which is prevalent in many churches across the country today. Morton explores some of the background of Asian cult worship that would have been prevalent in the Lycus Valley during the existence of the congregations addressed in the epistle. Abundant evidence has been found indicating that worship of Dionysus consisted of a large traveling guild of performers who went from town to town and performed religious worship.38 He notes that their ability to entertain was so great that the phrase "lights, action, ritual!"39 best describes the "spirit" of this worship/ entertainment performance.

Unfortunately, modern "Christian" worship bears more similarities to this historical picture of cult worship in the first century than to Colossians 3:16. Perhaps this is why Paul emphasized the teaching of the Gospel through worship in song. Joslin made this conclusion based on his study of the text and wisely stated, "The Colossian and Ephesian churches are to instruct one another by means of all manner of musical praise. This is to characterize their worship. It should also

characterize ours."<sup>40</sup> Colossians 3:16 should challenge the church today to rethink singing and place the primary focus on teaching one another and offering "a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that give thanks to His name" (Heb. 13:15, NASB).

The verse that follows Colossians 3:16 should not be overlooked in this discussion: "Whatever you do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks through Him to God the Father" (Col. 3:17, NASB). The Holy Spirit inspired Paul to write a clear statement about teaching in song. Verse 17 makes it clear that the church has no authority to add to that statement or diminish from it. This applies to the message of the song and the means of delivering it.

#### Conclusion


Paul's epistle to the Colossians is as relevant today as it was the day it was penned and delivered. The pagan-influenced environment surrounding the churches in the Lycus Valley was not much different than what surrounds churches today. Christians need the message of the preeminence of Christ now more than ever. They must internalize the fact that Jesus is the supreme ruler of the universe; spending time in Colossians is the best way to achieve that. Finally, the call to continue in the faith of the Gospel must resound from pulpits everywhere. My prayer is that the Lord's people will forever strive to "walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, to please Him in all respects, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God" (Col. 1:10).

## WBS, SIBI Partner to Train More Preachers



n 1971 as the radiant California sun glimmered on the ocean waves, inside an office stuck in the '60s with its wooden desk and retro flair, an idea was about to spark a revolution. Here sat a young missionary, his eyes alight with ambition, across from an elder seasoned in the trenches of mission work. The room, a sanctuary during decades of church labor, brimmed with the energy of impending change. The elder, with a lifetime of stories etched into the lines on his face, leaned forward, igniting the air with four simple words: "I have an idea."

This idea, a brainchild of Jimmy Lovell, found its roots in Truitt Adair, who would later become the president and then chancellor of Sunset International Bible Institute.

Before Lovell had even coined the term "World Bible School" (which happened in 1973), he envisioned Nigerian newspaper ads as seeds of this grand vision to use a correspondence course to teach the Gospel. With the first ad, thousands of responses flooded in from Nigeria, heralding the birth of what we know today as the World Bible School.

These four words, "I have an idea," have since woven together two ministries, SIBI and WBS, into a tapestry of shared mission and purpose. Their collaboration has been a synergy that has propelled the Gospel into countless lives. The legacy of those initial Nigerian newspaper ads has blossomed, with many of WBS's students continuing their journey at Sunset schools, some of which are now helmed by those very converts from the 1970s.


Innovation hasn't paused; WBS's new platforms and Sunset's distribution of over 17,000 Solar Players packed with WBS courses illustrate their evolving strategy to

spread the Word. Following this tradition of innovation, another pivotal "I have an idea" moment two years ago led to the launch of the 10,000 Voices initiative, a ground-breaking project that recently materialized on the WBS Online Lessons platform to develop more preachers. Five Sunset courses are now available for any WBS student who has completed the Master Series. The purpose is to prepare them for further ministry in their local congregation and possibly help them become a candidate to attend a Sunset school in their region.



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
